"Fear to Freedom" is a collaborative exhibition between the Middletown Historical Society and the art students of Appoquinimink High School, and explores the experience of the Hawkins family in their flight to freedom through Middletown. The opening is free to the public, and light refreshments will be served.

#### Objects from our Collection

Anyone who's ever watched a period drama probably knows what "calling cards" are. A visitor typically would give his/her card to the employee who opened the door, and the employee would show it (perhaps laid on a silver salver) to the lady of the house, and she would decide whether or not she was "at home", in other words, available to talk with the visitor.

The calling cards here were used by MOT people in the very early years of the 20th century, and were part of a collection kept by the family who lived in the 18th century house at Noxontown Mill. How many names do you recognize?



Rosetta and Mary Evans lived in the house; Mary married Norman C. Hicks. Turpin Rose was their maternal grandfather. He supervised the building of Old St. Paul's Church in Odessa. Harry Culver ran a drugstore on Main Street in Middletown, and the Brocksons are the ancestors of Irv Brockson, who lives near Silver Lake. Vandegrifts, Prices, Cochrans and Kings are families who have lived here since the 18th and 19th centuries.
